

A punctuation mark, at the end of a sentence tells what kind of sentence it is.



## What Kind Is It?

Recognizing statements and questions.

Read the sentences. Write **T** if it is a telling sentence.

Write **A** if it is an asking sentence.

Then write a 1 or a 2 at the end of each sentence.

Example:

**T** I have a pet frog.

**A** Do you have a pet?
