#1 Home Economics	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Strong voice and clear sense of purpose ▪ Provides possible solutions in her counterargument 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Attempts a strong conclusion with a final appeal, but could revise to be stronger ▪ Move from a list of reasons to more elaboration on most important reasons ▪ Tighten up thesis / introduction. Avoid “I’ve overheard” as a persuasive writer. ▪ Consider audience. Some words are too familiar, such as: “For goodness sake” and “All I am trying to say is....”

Understands basic structure of persuasive writing ▪ Sense of audience ▪ Consistent point of view 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Elaborate on reasons and evidence ▪ Build a more reasonable counterargument ▪ Introduction and conclusion need some revision ▪ Revise words and phrases. Uses some effective words, but words don’t necessarily enhance his message.

Knows his campus and is realistic in his suggestions ▪ Starts out general and becomes more specific 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Revise introduction – take off first paragraph and start with the second paragraph ▪ Elaborate on the conclusion ▪ Strengthen counterargument
