## Independent Study: SHORT STORY

## **EVALUATION**

A short story is evaluated for the preface, mechanics [variety in sentence structure, grammar and usage, spelling, capitalization, and punctuation], diction, form and structure [introduction, unity, coherence, conclusion], content [originality, creativity, plot, characterization, setting, atmosphere]

## **STEPS**

1. Use Worksheet #1-SS to select and develop a conflict.

*Note*: A short story is based on one of the four types of conflict: individual vs individual, individual vs himself/herself, individual vs the environment, or individual vs the supernatural [including fate].

 Use Worksheet #1-SS to develop the basic plot outline, based on your chosen conflict. Decide the way the conflict will be resolved; then create the steps necessary to start, develop, and resolve the conflict.

*Note*: Do not introduce sub-plots. The length of the assignment does not permit the development of more than one plot or the use of more than two or three characters.

- 3. Use **Worksheet #2-SS** to identify the main characters, usually two or three. Indicate how the characters relate to one another. Decide the way each character is to be introduced.
- 4. Use **Worksheet #3-SS** to select the setting, both time and place. Determine the way you will introduce the setting and build the atmosphere.
- 5. Follow the outline to write the rough draft. Do not worry about sentence structure, paragraph structure, grammar, or spelling.
- 6. In the first revision, concentrate on the content. The following questions should be used as a guide during this step:
  - Do the events follow logically?
  - Is enough information provided about the characters so that they are believable and act in a manner that is consistent with the characteristics provided?
  - Is the conflict resolved in a satisfactory manner?
  - Is the setting appropriate for the plot?
  - Are all the loose ends tied up?
- 8. In the second revision, concentrate on improving your writing style. Correct spelling and grammatical errors. Most writing programmes provide such checking features.
