Direct Object Worksheet

Sentence structure:
A <u>direct object</u> is a noun, pronoun, or word group that tells who or what receives the
action of the verb.
Examples:
I met Dr. Mason . (I met whom? I met <i>Dr. Mason. Dr. Mason</i> receives the action of the verb met.)
Bill hit a home run . (Bill hit what? Bill hit a home run. Home run receives the action of the verb hit.)
A direct object CANNOT be in a prepositional phrase!
A <u>preposition</u> is a word that shows the relationship of a noun or pronoun to another word. List some commonly used prepositions: beside.
along, off, on, out, as, at, with, of, up, like, in, by, to, through, without, within, until, inside
This is a sentence that has a prepositional phrase and does NOT have a D.O. Example: She worked with clay. (Clay is NOT the direct object of the verb worked; it
is the object of the preposition with.)
Are you going to always have a direct object in a sentence? Label all the words in the following sentence:
She worked the clay with her hands.
