Date: March 2008

Strategy: Determining Importance

<u>Objective</u>: The student will establish the purpose for reading, search for new facts, develop questions specific to the reading, and determine what is important in the reading.

<u>Materials Needed</u>: United States map of Native American tribes, copies of "On Being Indian," student generated questions, Read/Reflect/Respond forms.

<u>Anticipatory Set</u>: Display the United States map designating the location of various tribes. Discuss the students' different tribal affiliations.

Procedure

Beginning: Read aloud "On Being Indian," pausing after each paragraph and briefly summarizing the main idea of each paragraph.

 $\underline{\textit{Middle}}$ (Guided Practice): Students will generate questions about the reading. The teacher will create a question worksheet using the students' questions.

<u>End</u>: The students will share read "On Being Indian" and working with a partner supply responses to the questions.

<u>Evaluation</u>: The questions generated by the students and their responses to these questions.

<u>Differentiation for Leveled Learners</u>: Most of the activities will be accomplished as a large group or with partners.

<u>Comments</u>: It was interesting that the students had a difficult time generating thoughtful questions. The questions were very literal and even then it was difficult to generate questions. I was even more concerned at how difficult and inaccurate their responses were to each others questions. This is a skill we must continue to practice and apply.
