

Quotation Marks

Quotation marks are used to set off the exact words of a speaker or writer.

- They are necessary to indicate that a direct quote from the text of the document, e.g. "There are a really exciting moment," *interviewer* "they suffered."
- Quotations need not enclose the text of a sentence in single or double quotation marks, e.g. "Very interesting," I thought as Harry was coming along and I said to him, "..."
- **Indirect quotations** do not have punctuation that does not begin with a quoted letter unless it is italicized, e.g. "The author said, "In the new year will come..."
