PATTERN 1: COMPOUND SENTENCE: SEMICOLON, NO CONJUNCTION

Model: S V ; S V

Example: "Success has many fathers; failure is an orphan."

(Double space the sentences)

1. The last of the soldiers left; the city was deserted and in flames.
2. The cat's tail began to switch back and forth; finally, it fell off.
3. The crisis had passed; we decided to continue with our plans.

PATTERN 1a: COMPOUND SENTENCE: SEMICOLON, CONJUNCTIVE ADVERB

Model: S V ; however, S V

Example: This gadget won't work; therefore, don't buy it.

PATTERN 1b: COMPOUND SENTENCE: SEMICOLON plus, COMMA & COORDINATING CONJUNCTION

Model: S V ; S V , and S V

Example: It was radical; it was daring, but mostly it was cheap.

PATTERN 1c: DOUBLE COMPOUND SENTENCE

Model: S V ; S V ; S V

Example: I came; I saw; I conquered
