



Nelson Mandela was a great leader who spent his life working for equality and justice in South Africa. He inspired the people of the world to work tirelessly for a better life. Mandela was born on July 18, 1918, in South Africa. He was named Rolihlahla, which means "troublemaker" in the Xhosa language. His grandfather was the ruler of the Thembu people and his father was a local chief.

Mandela was the first person in his family to attend school (his parents' name both illiterate). That year he went to both a local and new school.

He became involved in the African National Congress (ANC), a revolutionary group that fought against the white government's racial separation and oppression in South Africa. He organized boycotts and strikes to fight for voting rights and equality for all South Africans.

In 1964, Mandela was sentenced to life in prison for fighting apartheid. After spending 27 years in prison, Mandela was released in 1990, when apartheid was repealed. Mandela won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1993.

In 1994, South Africa held its first truly democratic, non-racial election and elected Nelson Mandela as its president. Mandela chose broad reconciliation, the peaceful resolution of grievances after decades of repressive racial laws. Without Mandela's guidance, South Africa might have faced one a bloody civil war.

Nelson Mandela died on December 5, 2013, at the age of 95. He will be remembered as one of the greatest peace-makers and statesmen of all time.
