## **Phonics Rules**

 If a word or syllable has only one vowel and it comes at the beginning or a word, the vowel is usually short. These are called VC words.

For example: an, ant, end, in, up, on, ox

If a word or syllable has only one vowel and it comes between two consonants, the vowel is usually short. These are called CVC words.

For example: short a in fast, bat, cap, rack, hand short i in sit, mitt, milk, lips, sink short e in jet, men, web, tent, belt short o in pop, box, lock, hot, rock short u in run, lunch, bus, duck, tub

 When a syllable ends in a silent "e", the silent "e" is a signal that the vowel in front of it is long. This is often called the magic e or the bossy e.

For example: make, kite, rope, use.

4. Vowel Pairs: If a syllable or one syllable word has two vowels, the first vowel usually stands for the long sound, and the second vowel is silent. These are often called vowel teams. The saying is used: When two vowels go walking the first one does the talking.
