

THE USE OF HAS – HAVE – HAD

These verbs can be used with nouns and the verb not only as helping verbs
but also as full verbs. They express possession or ownership.

Example:

There have been sales.

They have a supermarket.

We have a central office.

HAS—coupled with singular nouns and pronouns, usually in past tense.
"We had a house earlier."

HAVE—coupled with plural nouns and pronouns, usually in present tense.
"They have a supermarket."

Remember about singular nouns and many other meanings.

See also how **have** becomes **had** in past tense.

Also used in a question form ending like

"Where have you been?" "Where will you be next Friday?"

It is often used with the present continuous tense

which is based on now, today.

"Now there is a better hotel."

HAD—in this past tense applies the last time, once in the past tense, it may
not be much longer than plural forms (of present and past tense),
the present in "We had".

Example:

"I had a car."

"They had single children, never been married."
