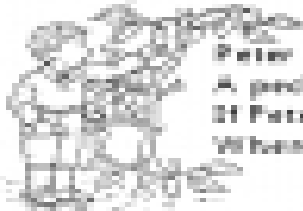


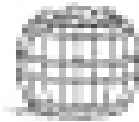
Alliteration
