

| <ul style="list-style-type: none">1 After the Civil Rights Act, the 14th Amendment was passed. All former slaves were made citizens.2 Many freed slaves began to build new lives. They formed communities. They built churches and schools. They started businesses.3 Other laws were passed in the 1870s to help protect former slaves from unfair treatment.4 The Civil Rights Act of 1866 stated that all people born in the United States were citizens. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">5 Many with voting citizenship, some former slaves from the South were elected to Congress.6 Congress created a group to help former slaves in March 1865. The group was called the Freedmen's Bureau.7 About two years later, the 15th Amendment gave African American men the right to vote.8 The 13th Amendment was passed in December 1865. It ended slavery in the United States. |
