## **Literacy Strategy: Active Reading**

To implement in the classroom:

- Explain the research behind the strategy. Use the excerpt from Chris Tovani's book for guidance.
- 2. **Explain the actual process** for Active Reading: What will the students actually be doing? What should it look like?
- 3. **Model the process with a passage** and do a think-aloud. Show the students how you would think through the passage (maybe use an overhead to let them see you mark up a text).
- Give the students lots of opportunities to practice, and give them feedback. Make sure students are working toward meaningful connections with the text.

## **Tips for Modeling Active Reading**

- 1. Use a short story, poem or article (something accessible).
- 2. Give them a "Cheat Sheet" with the symbols for Active Reading (See below & on other sheet)
- **3.** Read the story or text aloud, while the students practice annotating, either on the text or using Post-It notes.
- **4.** Ask the students for examples of what they wrote down; discuss why what they picked out was important or why it wasn't.
- 5. Students will begin, through time, to see the difference between critical information and mere details.
- 6. Practice, Practice, Practice!
