

## Story Elements

<b>Genre</b>	The type of story or literary work.
<b>Author</b>	Person who writes the story/book.
<b>Setting</b>	Where and when a story takes place.
<b>Main Characters</b>	The important people in the story.
<b>Themes</b>	<p>The underlying or stated main idea of a story.</p> <p>*Often, the author implies the theme through the narrator's/main character's thoughts and feelings. The theme can also be the message an author is trying to send.</p>
<b>Conflict</b>	<p>The major problem in the story.</p> <p>Two categories of conflict:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>External</b>—happens outside of the character, involves more than 1 person, can be observed.</li> <li>2. <b>Internal</b>—happens inside of the character, involve only 1 person, can only be observed in the thoughts &amp; feelings.</li> </ol> <p>Three types of conflict:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Man vs. Nature (External)</li> <li>2. Man vs. Self (Internal)</li> <li>3. Man vs. Man (External or Internal)</li> </ol>
<b>Climax</b>	The large event that changes the outcome of the entire story.
<b>Plot</b>	<p>The sequence of all events in a story.</p> <p>*The plot is usually what we summarize.</p>
<b>Critique</b>	A reader's personal thoughts & opinions on the story or book. Involves both "Likes" and "Dislikes."
