A <u>direct object</u> is a noun, pronoun, or word group that tells *who* or *what* receives the action of the verb.

Examples:

I met **Dr. Mason**. (I met whom? I met *Dr. Mason. Dr. Mason* receives the action of the verb met.)

Bill hit a **home run**. (Bill hit what? Bill hit a home run. Home run receives the action of the verb hit.)

A direct object **CANNOT** be in a prepositional phrase!

A <u>preposition</u> is a word that shows the relationship of a noun or pronoun to another word. List some commonly used prepositions:

beside, along, off, on, out, as, at, with, of, up, like, in, by, to, through, without, within, until, inside
