

Pronouns are words that replace nouns.

Singular	1 <sup>st</sup>	I	me	mine	myself	my (book)
	2 <sup>nd</sup>	you	you	yours	yourself	your

Plural	1 <sup>st</sup>	we	us	ours	ourselves	our
	2 <sup>nd</sup>	you	you	yours	yourselves	your
	3 <sup>rd</sup>	they	them	theirs	themselves	their

\*Adjectives must modify a noun—  
My book is on the table.

#### Examples of PRONOUNS

**Subject:** \_\_\_\_\_ likes to do homework. \_\_\_\_\_ are students at College of Marin.

**Object:** The teacher gave \_\_\_\_\_ some homework. I told \_\_\_\_\_ the good news.

**Possessive:** This pen is \_\_\_\_\_. These books are \_\_\_\_\_.

**Reflexive:** John did the homework by \_\_\_\_\_. While cooking dinner, Mary cut \_\_\_\_\_.

#### OTHER KINDS OF PRONOUNS

Relative Pronouns (introduces a relative clause) (some examples, not all listed)	that, who, whom, which, whose, whoever ...
Indefinite Pronouns (some examples, not all listed)	everyone, anyone, somewhere, everything ... all, each, few, many, one, several ...
Demonstrative pronouns ** (show/demonstrate); replace demonstrative adjective + noun	[near] this, these [far] that, those

\*\*There are also demonstrative ADJECTIVES: This book is mine. Those cars belong to the company.

#### Examples

**Relative:** The person who phoned me last night was Susan. The car that I drive is old.  
Whoever crosses the finish line first will win the race.

**Indefinite:** Can anyone answer this question? Many have already signed-up.

**Demonstrative:** This is mine. Those belong to the company.
