Walter: Different from the lemon that I bring you something else?

John: No, thank you, that's \_\_\_\_\_.

Walter: Certainly.

John: Thank you very much, \_\_\_\_\_ to the coffee.

Walter: From London.

John: \_\_\_\_\_, thank you very much.

Walter: You're \_\_\_\_\_, have a good day.

John: Thank you, bye \_\_\_\_\_.

**Notice how the writer asks: "What would you like?" and the responder: "I'd like ...". "I'd like" is the polite form used when asking and requesting.**
