

What else can we say about the Subject of a sentence:

<b>Subject:</b>	I	first person singular
	*You	2 <sup>nd</sup> person singular
	He/She	3 <sup>rd</sup> person singular
	We	1 <sup>st</sup> person plural
	*You all	2 <sup>nd</sup> person plural
	They	3 <sup>rd</sup> person plural

\*"You" and "You all" in English are rarely used by English speakers. It is more common to use "you" and "you all" in casual speech.

## II. Present Simple Tense

(subject) + (present form) and (object)

Ex: I **eat** files  
She **calls** the doctor  
We **visit** the doctor  
They **set** the appointment

The only time we add an "s" to the verb is when we are talking in the 3<sup>rd</sup> person singular
