Personal Pronoun Reference Chart (an English language resource)

Personal pronouns are used in the place of the name/s when referring to one or more person in the 3rd person. Pronouns are singular or plural. The most commonly used personal pronouns, "she" and "he", make reference to gender. A number of pronouns do not reference gender and are termed gender-neutral pronouns. Follows is a limited chart of common pronouns, chosen to illustrate both use and grammatical form.
