

How to Write a Five Paragraph Essay

In order to take the best of a writing assignment, there are a few rules that can be followed in order to first success. While you can never know exactly what a teacher will like, as long as you have shown your own well written, successful essay. The best of all writing is that the power is in your hands. There is no grade a "right" or "wrong" answer. It simply has to select an argument and back it up. If you do that, then your essay should be successful, regardless of whether or not it is read.

The best high school essay should be organized in the following five paragraph structure:

1. Introduction
2. Body Paragraph One
3. Body Paragraph Two
4. Body Paragraph Three
5. Conclusion

This list is a basic guideline by which to structure all your essays. Obviously, this can vary in length with paragraph number. However, with the context of the stated structure, it is something you will endeavor to write a successful essay.

Let us go back to show through this basic structure to examine the elements of this type.

1. Introduction

The Introduction consists of one opening line. This opening line is a generalization about the topic, perhaps to give you an idea of the topic. It can also be a question. When you feel you are ready to introduce the specific focus of the essay, then you write the thesis statement. The thesis statement should generally come at the end of the introductory paragraph. You should also put your argument with its supporting evidence in the sentence. Generally, the thesis statement is your topic for the essay and the first sentence of the introduction.

2. Body Paragraph One

The Body Paragraph One should open with a transitional sentence. It should lead the reader into the first point of evidence you use to support your thesis statement, your argument. It is essentially a first step for the paragraph. From the transitional opening sentence, you begin to give evidence to support your argument. The evidence must be relevant around a single theme and should come in the form of a question or fact. All information from a primary source. If you did two more of these three alternate body paragraphs, then the essay becomes a strong Body Paragraph One will lead with the theme for your argument. You may have several pieces of evidence to support this one theme, which is generally five. Once you are done with evidence, you can end with at least one or two sentences explaining why you use it. Then, wrap up the body paragraph with a re-concluding sentence summarizing why what you have presented in that paragraph.
