

The Gettysburg Address

This is the text for Lincoln's most famous speech. It is inscribed in the granite walls of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C.

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal."

"Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation or any nation so conceived and so dedicated can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men living and dead who struggled here have consecrated it far beyond our power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have done than for us merely to落成 it. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that this nation, henceforward, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, shall not perish from the earth."
