


A PLACE FOR EVERYTHING

- These facts about Matthew Henson, one of the first explorers to reach the North Pole, are not organized.
- Identify three categories and label each card with one category.
- Then sort the facts according to the categories and write each fact's number on the matching card.



1. Matthew Henson and Robert E. Peary made three attempts to reach the North Pole. They came closest on the third trip in 1896. After that trip, Peary got credit for discovering the North Pole.
2. When Matthew was eleven years old, his parents died.
3. When Henson was 21, he began working for Peary as his valet, or personal servant. By the time Henson was 36, he was part of Peary's final Arctic expedition.
4. Robert Peary got credit for discovering the North Pole.
5. Peary received all the honors at the time, and Henson was recognized much later. His honors included the Perry Polar Expedition Medal in 1944, the U.S. Navy Medal of Merit in 1948, and a gold medal from The Geographic Society of Chicago in 1960.
6. Just two years after Matthew's parents died, he went to work as a ship's cabin boy.
7. Henson's hunting, dog-driving, and language skills made him an invaluable Arctic explorer.
8. Peary had lost nine of his ten dogs on an earlier Arctic trip. So he needed help to cross the uneven Arctic ice on the third trip to the North Pole.
9. Robert E. Peary was honored with a promotion to rear admiral in 1911.
