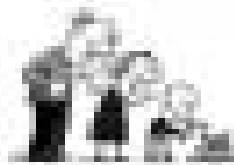

What is Conflict? What Does it Look Like in Literature?

In literature, **conflict** is the struggle between opposing characters, forces or emotions in which a story's action depends. Conflicts are essential elements of any good narrative. It is what drives a story forward and makes it interesting. Think about it: a story isn't really interesting unless some characters face with some obstacles or challenges, whether it's a thrilling mystery story, etc.

There are two main categories of conflict: **external conflict** and **internal conflict**.

External conflict involves a character's struggle against some outside force, another character, society, or a force of nature.

Three types of external conflict are:

- **Person vs. Person**
Example: A teenage boy argues at night with a boy bulling him.
- **Person vs. Society**
Example: A woman fights with a doctor in a court trial.
- **Person vs. Nature**
Example: A man battles a storm to get his ship through a storm.

Internal conflict occurs when a character struggles with opposing needs, feelings or emotions within themselves.

Internal conflict is also known as:

- **Person vs. Self**
Example: A young woman struggles with a decision made by her parents, but she has a different idea of what she should do.

In many cases, a story's protagonist will face one external conflict which is at the heart of the story, along with several other minor conflicts that come up along the way.
