

Sentence Types (Compound / Complex)

A compound sentence contains two simple sentences.
Conjunctions that make a compound sentence are: FANBOYS
(for + and + nor + but + yet + or)

- I want to eat tonight, and she is not here to cook.
- Bill eats all the time, but he never gains weight.
- You will receive a lot of gifts, as the will you are back at Burger King.
- You cannot make it to the party, then will be come later at Burger King.
- The teacher is after me today, so I need to lose some weight.
- I would love some weight, as I've found out a lot of other benefits.
- Honey smells, you also in every season.

Notes about the compound sentence:

It's a combination.

Example: Bill left home, he still got there on time.

- It's a compound sentence because, however, more, and, than, therefore, also, moreover, otherwise, as but, for example, besides, consequently, neither more, nor, also, either with a coordinate conjunction between the independent clauses and
- conjunction after it.

Example: Bill left home, however, he still got there on time.
