OTHER KINDS OF PRONOUNS

Relative Pronouns (introduces a relative clause) <i>(some examples, not all listed)</i>	that, who, whom, which, whose, whoever ...
Indefinite Pronouns <i>(some examples, not all listed)</i>	everyone, anyone, somewhere, everything ... all, each, few, many, one, several ...
Demonstrative pronouns ** <i>(show/demonstrate); replace demonstrative adjective + noun</i>	[near] this, these [far] that, those

**There are also demonstrative ADJECTIVES: This book is mine. Those cars belong to the company.

Examples

Relative: The person who phoned me last night was Susan. The car that I drive is old.
Whoever crosses the finish line first will win the race.

Indefinite: Can anyone answer this question? Many have already signed-up.

Demonstrative: This is mine. Those belong to the company.
