

**RIPPED FROM THE HEADLINES
FORMING (mostly) SIMPLE SENTENCES
FROM COMPOUND/COMPLEX SENTENCES**

In the news, one common goal is to answer all the basic questions (who, what, where, etc.) in the first paragraph, or even the first sentence. This means that a lot of information is contained in that one sentence. Try to break it down: Create as many simple sentences from each headline sentence as you can.

EXAMPLE:

Search teams looking for millionaire adventurer Steve Fossett may have found the wreckage of the plane he was flying when he disappeared more than a year ago.
Steve Fossett was a millionaire.
Steve Fossett was an adventurer.
Steve Fossett disappeared.
He disappeared over a year ago.
He was flying a plane when he disappeared.
Search teams have been looking for him.
They may have found the wreckage of the plane.
