**RIPPED FROM THE HEADLINES**  
**FORMING (mostly) SIMPLE SENTENCES**  
**FROM COMPOUND/COMPLEX SENTENCES**

In the news, one common goal is to answer all the basic questions (who, what, where, etc.) in the first paragraph, or even the first sentence. This means that a lot of information is contained in that one sentence. Try to break it down: Create as many simple sentences from each headline sentence as you can.

**EXAMPLE:**

Search teams looking for millionaire adventurer Steve Fossatt may have found the wreckage of the plane he was flying when he disappeared more than a year ago.

- Steve Fossatt was a millionaire.
- Steve Fossatt was an adventurer.
- Steve Fossatt disappeared.
- He disappeared over a year ago.
- He was flying a plane when he disappeared.
- Search teams have been looking for him.
- They may have found the wreckage of the plane.
