TOPIC (key point; concept; skill): Similes and Metaphors

STANDARDS: 5.1.5 - READING: Word Recognition, Fluency, and Vocabulary Development - Understand and explain the figurative use of words in similes (comparisons that use *like* or as: The stars were like a million diamonds in the sky.) and metaphors (implied comparisons: The stars were brilliant diamonds in the night sky.); 5.3.5 - READING: Literary Response and Analysis - Describe the function and effect of common literary devices, such as imagery, metaphor, and symbolism.

- Symbolism: the use of an object to represent something else; for example, a dove might symbolize peace.
- Imagery: the use of language to create vivid pictures in the reader's mind.
- Metaphor: an implied comparison in which a word or phrase is used in place of another, such as He was drowning in money
