British:

- "We're in debt up to our ears, old chap."
- "I've got a splendid idea, I have."
- "What's that, old chap? We need money and we need it now!"
- "You'll love this so much that you'll name it after me! Put a tax on all goods like paper, lead, glass... We'll have money rolling in!"
- "Quite right, old chap. That's the ticket. We'll call it the Townsend Act! After you!"

Both:

- "We can't afford to let them get away with that!"
- "They know who's boss now!"
- "Money, money, money!"

Americans:

- "Man, that Stamp Act was really stupid, wasn't it? Did they really think we'd just let them tax us without protest, peaceful though it was?"
- "Yeah, what do you think they'll come up with next? Taxing everything we use?"
- "Nah, they learned their lesson: Don't mess with us Americans—we're too smart for them!"
- "Let's hope so. I've had enough tarring and feathering for a lifetime."
- "Yeah, me too!"
