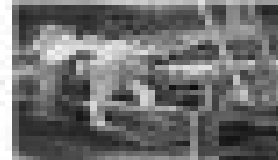


Read the following text carefully.

Street Sleepers



You have to help thousands that, at your breakfast time, don't even have one loaf of bread. You don't have bread. It doesn't matter what they eat. They sleep on the street. It's very serious. Don't let them die. We will make it possible. Or will they?

- 1) Imagine this. You are 12 years old and live in the city. You sometimes get up and go to work. You probably work 12 hours in a small, noisy room, making clothes. Your back hurts and you are very tired. You have to finish the work you are making but you can't stop. You become probably even a man one day. You start a family, you are a young man and you have to support your wife and children like the children who work in small shops around the world. Street sleepers are homeless when people work long hours in dangerous conditions and earn very little for their work.
- 2) Many international organizations help workers in developing countries because the production costs are lower. A pair of shoes here, made in Brazil, costs only half of the same, made here in the USA in the shops.
- 3) All countries want to work in the best conditions of their people. Many would also help the "street sleepers", like the ILO, a organization for "Workers Against Street Sleepers". Unfortunately, countries' attitudes have started to change. Some governments and some "official agencies" in the developed world prefer to reduce helping their products, they have to international problems.
