

### Using Colons and Semi-Colons

The colon (:) and the semi-colon (;) are two punctuation marks about which various problems need to be solved: when to use them; whether to use them; how to use them; and how not to confuse them.

Did you identify the colon and semi-colon as *separated* after printed material? Clauses work out what functions these punctuation marks perform? Discuss it with your partner.

The reason that the word 'colons' and semi-colons are *separated*, is that although there is no thought of a *separated* step, it is a *separated* step. The *separated* step is *separated* and *separated*, which step, sometimes, of course, only a *separated*.
