How to Write a Cinquain

Basically, a cinquain is a 5-line poem or stanza with variations.

Variation 1:

Line 1: 1-word title

2-word phrase describing your title; or,

you can just use 2 words 3-word phrase describing an action relating to your title, or just actions Line 3: words

Line 4: 4-word phrase describing a feeling relating to your topic, or just feeling words

Line 5: 1 word that refers to your title

Variation 2:

Line 1: 2 syllables

Line 2: 4 syllables

Line 3: 6 syllables Line 4: 8 syllables

Line 5: 2 syllables

Cinquain Sample (Variation 1)

Forest Cool, green
Growing, changing, living
I'm calm and serene Nature

Cinquain Sample (Variation 2)

Forest Stretching up high
Tall trees growing taller
Compared to them, I am tiny Giants

How to Write a Diamante

The Diamante is arranged in a diamond pattern, using 7 lines this way:

1. Line 1:

1 word subject (noun) 2 adjectives describing Line 1 Line 2: 3 words ending in -ing or -ed to Line 3: describe Line I noun

4. Line 7: 1 word growing out of, or opposite to, Line 1 noun (another noun)

5. Line 6: 2 adjectives déscribing Line 7 3 words ending in -ing or -ed to describe Line 7 noun 4 words: 2 related to the noun in 6. Line 5:

7. Line 4: Line 1 and 2 related to the noun in Line 7.
