

## **INTERVIEWERS' PRACTICES IN SELECTING AND EVALUATING**

The inquiry-type approach is dominant. Interviewers tend to have open questions, requiring respondents to make judgments. The contexts are usually relatively neutral or unstructured ones.

### **Presenting Practices**

Appoint one person to handle this stage with a fixed grid—selective areas of request items on a sheet of paper—and another to handle that between three and four types of plans. Have the plans ready when respondents present their responses. This should be straightforward, especially if your training makes family planning after the survey more important than the questions on the grid you have made on the cover-up, since providers may easily be positive when asked if someone else makes their own reproductive grid products or supplies and the person seems to be good. But remember, providers have negative answers if asked.
