The boys and girls will go to Washington, D.C.

Complete Predicate: includes all the words that state the action or condition of the subject

Ex: My grandmother made this dress last year. The boys and girls will go to Washington, D.C.

Simple Subject: the main word in the complete subject

Ex: Every ambitious **person** is working hard.

All the <u>trees</u> on that lawn are giant oaks.

Simple Predicate: a verb within the complete predicate

Ex: Every ambitious person is working hard.

All the trees on that lawn are giant oaks.
