Kwanzaa is an African-American holiday celebrated mainly in the US for the week between 26th \_\_\_\_\_ and 1st January each year.

The holiday was established in 1966 to help \_\_\_\_\_ Americans remember and celebrate their \_\_\_\_\_. The word "Kwanzaa" comes from the \_\_\_\_\_ language and means "\_\_\_\_\_ fruits". Each day of the seven days is dedicated to one of "The \_\_\_\_\_ Principles of Kwanzaa".

A candle is lit each day on the special candlestick, the "\_\_\_\_\_"; to represent these principles. The kinara is placed on a mkeka, a traditional \_\_\_\_\_ mat, and one ear of \_\_\_\_\_ is also placed on the mat for each child in the family. A fruit \_\_\_\_\_, called a "mazao", is also displayed, along with a special "unity" \_\_\_\_\_, out of which everyone drinks. Families decorate their homes with traditional African crafts. The colours \_\_\_\_\_, green and black - representing the African flag - are used. Gifts, known as "zawadi", are given on the last day of Kwanzaa.
