

- o Next, explain one or two of the opposing side's points to show how readers might object to your argument. Then, show how these arguments are not reasonable, not logical, or not effective. Be sure to explain your own viewpoint and why it is the best choice.

Final Steps: Review and Edit

- 1) Review that your reader can understand your points. You can best convince them of your arguments by writing in logical or aggressive language and by using lots of evidence (facts, statistics, examples, expert opinions, or even personal experience).
- 2) Be your reader!
- 3) To increase the chances that your reader will agree with you, start each paragraph with ideas that both sides agree upon before arguing your case.
- 4) Show the other side's strongest arguments to defend against challenges from other readers or your teachers.
- 5) To your conclusion, emphasize why your topic is important, summarize your arguments, and restate your position as the most sensible choice. Do not include new evidence or arguments.
