Rightly Speaking

The Bill of Rights states the first ten amendments to the U.S. Constitution. These amendments guarantee the basic freedoms that citizens—including you—enjoy today!

Read through the summary of the Bill of Rights below. Then read each situation and decide which amendment applies. Write that number in the blank. Next, mark a ✓ in the ink bottle if a right is being exercised or an X if a right is being taken away.

Amendment 1

You have freedoms of religion, speech, and the press. You also have the right to meet together peacefully and to let the government know if you disagree with its actions.

Amendment 2

You have the right to own and bear arms (weapons).

Amendment 3

The government cannot force you to keep soldiers in your home during peaceful times.

Amendment 4

You or your property cannot be searched or seized without a warrant based on a good reason.

Amendment 5

You can't be held for a crime without an indictment from a grand jury. You can't be tried twice for the same crime. You don't have to testify against yourself in court. You have the right to live process of the law. Your property cannot be taken for public use without payment.

Amendment 6

You have the right to a fair trial. You have the right to find attorneys to represent you and to have a lawyer to defend you.

Amendment 7

In civil cases, you have the right to a trial by jury.

Amendment 8

Excessive fines, excessive bail, or cruel and unusual punishment are not allowed.

Amendment 9

You have other rights that are not specifically listed in the Constitution.

Amendment 10

The federal government may have only the powers given to it by the Constitution. Any other powers belong to the states and to the people.
