

Phrasal verbs: What are they?

Phrasal verbs are verbs of more than one word.

We make phrasal verbs by using the prefix:

verb + adverb

E.g. **give up**, **stop**
(Verb + Adverb)

To give up (for when doing something – usually unwanted) you don't like it or it's too difficult.)

E.g., I used to **give up** smoking because it's bad for your health.

How many kinds of phrasal verbs are there?

There are four types of phrasal verbs. Phrasal verbs can be separable or inseparable and they can take an object or not.

Phrasal verbs which don't take an object are transitive.

These phrasal verbs are often intransitive.

E.g. Stand up "he stands up during the lesson."

Phrasal verbs which can take an object are transitive.

Verbs which can take an object can be separable or inseparable.
