6. Recognize the relationship between economic activity and the quality of life
7. Assess the connections between historical events and contemporary issues
8. Assess the influence and contributions of individuals and cultures
9. Analyze different forms of government
10. Compare rights and responsibilities of individuals within various political structures
11. Recognize common cultural characteristics
12. Assess the influence of major religions, ethical beliefs, and values
13. Describe historic, economic, and cultural connections that exist among the people of the world.
