



Possessive apostrophes

A possessive apostrophe shows us who or what belongs to somebody or something.

We usually write the brothers of Madhur as Madhur's brothers,
and we write the sister of the brothers as the brothers' sister.

The apostrophe is always placed after the word that is "owning."
Add an *s* if it sounds necessary.

Write the friend of Thomas as Thomas's friend.
