Sentence types

syntactic typology of clauses

- ii. declarative sentence (also 'indicative')
 - typical use: make a statement
- iii. interrogative sentence
 - typical use: ask a question
 - Yes/No question
- wh-question iv. **imperative** sentence
- typical use: give a directive
- v. exclamative sentence
 - typical use: make an exclamation

Declarative sentences

- · usyally display unmarked word order
- (normally) subject is present and precedes the finite verb
- (a) She has gone. (b) (lt) looks like rain situative ellispis
- default pragmatics: statement
- non-default uses
 - (c) She has gone?
 - question (with rising intonation)
- (d) You haven't closed the door.
 directive (i.e. order to close the door)

Interrogative sentences (1)

- Yes/No questions
 - appropriate answer: *yes* or *no* (or *perhaps/maybe*) auxiliary is fronted or dummy *do* is inserted
 - (a) Has, she t, gone?
 - (b) Did you t see Santa?
- wh-questions
 - main clause: starts with wh-element, auxiliary in second position
- (c) Who $\dot{\text{will}}$ you see t $\dot{,}$?
- (d) How heavy is that package t ?
- evidence for trace: echo-question
- (e) You saw WHOM?

Interrogative sentences (2)

- fronted auxiliary is moved to C
- · complementiser and auxiliary compete for this position
 - (a) * I wondered whether can she go
- interrogatives = S'-structures



Interrogative sentences (3)

- Subject wh-questions no dummy do (a) Who saw him?
- subordinate questions (indirect questions) no subject-auxiliary inversion
 - yes/no question
 - (b) I wonder whether/if she has gone.
 - wh-question
 - (c) I wonder what she saw t .
 - (d) I wonder how heavy, the package is ti.
- non-default use: directive
 - (e) Can you be quiet?
