Read Bingo's campfire story. Then, answer each question about the story. Write your answers on the lines.


Bingo's Story

Reading involves different levels of thinking. Help increase your child's reading comprehension by asking a variety of questions that foster thinking skills. Here are some types of questions you can ask:

- Who/What? (questions involving recall of facts in the story)
- Why? (questions that ask the reader to analyse the facts)
- What would happen if . . . ? (questions that ask the reader to predict an outcome)
- Should the character have . . . ? (questions that ask the reader to evaluate what happened)
