In 1955, one woman's refusal to give up her seat on a bus helped end segregation on public buses. That woman was Rosa Parks, and when she disobeyed a bus driver who ordered her to give her seat to a white passenger, she was arrested and taken to jail. Though other African-Americans had bravely refused to give up their seats on buses in the past, it was the Montgomery Bus Boycott, led in part by Rosa Parks, that helped end segregation on public transportation.
