

Verb	Present subjunctive (yo form)	Notes
ser	sea	<i>Sea is a reduced form of Latin sedeam, from the verb sedere "to sit". Sedere is the source of many forms of ser, including the infinitive.</i>
saber	sepa	<i>Sepa is the predictable development from Latin sapiam.</i>
dar	dé	<i>These forms are regular except for the accent marks, needed to distinguish dé from de and to maintain correct stress on esté.</i>
estar	esté	
haber	haya	<i>The /y/ is a softened version of the /b/ of Latin habeat and the /d/ of vadat. The latter comes from the verb vadere "to hasten", which is also the source of the present tense of ir (voy, vas, va, etc.).</i>
ir	vaya
