

## Directional Prepositions: Beyond & Toward

Every sentence has to have a subject (a person or thing) and a verb (what that person or thing does.) But a really good sentence tells more than just a single subject and verb. Other kinds of words help make the sentence more exciting. A prepositional can tell us where (about where the subject is, and where the subject is doing something).

Two prepositions that tell where are **Beyond** and **Toward**. Use beyond to show that one thing or person is on the far side of than another. For example:

The ball kept on rolling until it was beyond the trees.

Use toward to show that one person or thing is in the direction of someone or something else. For example:

The ball rolled toward the little boy.
