

## Spoonerisms

A spoonerism is an interchange of the sounds (usually the first sound) of words in a phrase, name or sentence to create a humorous effect. Spoonerisms are named after Dr. W. A. Spooner who was always changing his words around. He said things like "well-boiled icicle" instead of "well-oiled bicycle." Spoonerisms are sometimes created by mistake when people accidentally interchange their words. Some authors, however, use spoonerisms in their writing, and some people have written entire stories using spoonerisms.
