

"a" or "an"

General Principle:

If a word begins with a consonant, then we use "a" before it.

Examples... a dog a cat a book

If a word begins with a vowel (a, e, i, o, u), then we use "an" before it.

Examples... an egg an eye an ice-cream

However, if the word begins with a consonant but it sounds like a vowel, then we use "an".

Example... an hour The h in hour is silent so the word "hour" sounds like it begins with a vowel.

In the same way, if a word begins with a vowel but it sounds like a consonant, we use "a".

Example... a university The u in university sounds like the letter y so we use "a", not "an".
