

<b>Symbol</b>	A thing or sign that connotes something else.	A rose or a dove.
<b>Alliteration</b>	Several words close together that begin with the same letter.	A dangerous dream of death.
<b>Pathetic fallacy</b>	When the weather/time of year reflects the mood/atmosphere of the text.	It was a dreary night in December.
<b>Metaphor</b>	When a thing is said to be the same as another thing that may in reality be quite different.	Her words were stones.
<b>Simile</b>	Two things are compared using the connectors "like" or "as".	Her words were like stones.
<b>Enjambement</b>	When sentences in a poem do not end at the end of the line.	This room is breaking out of itself, cracking through its own walls.
<b>Rhyme</b>	The last syllable(s) in a line sound alike.	We are red, we are white We are Danish dynamite.
<b>Repetition</b>	A word is repeated several times.	A drum, a drum. Macbeth doth come.
<b>Hypothec</b>	Something is exaggerated.	My feet are killing me.
<b>Assonance</b>	A similar vowel sound repeated in a line.	I dreamt of death and wet the bed.
<b>Personification</b>	An inanimate object is given life-like qualities.	The tree waved at me in the wind.
<b>Onomatopoeia</b>	A word that reflects the sound it makes.	Zip, clang, choo-choo train.
