

What, Whom, Whose

The following are some exercises on the use of "What," "Whom," and "Whose."

Do not forget to follow the use of "What," "Whom," and "Whose," and continue to understand the difference between subject, object, and possessive cases.

Subject Case sentences

- What is the question?
- Whom is the subject?
- Whose is the subject?

Object Case sentences

- What is the object?
- Whom is the object?
- Whose is the object?

Possessive Case sentences (the person who is the subject)

- Whose is the subject?
- Whom is the subject?
- Whose is the subject?

"What" is a Subject Pronoun

"What" is a subject pronoun like "he," "she," and "it" in the subject case. We use "What" to ask which person, place, or thing is the subject of a sentence.

Examples:

- What is the subject of the sentence?
- What is the subject of the sentence?
- What is the subject of the sentence?

"Whom" is an Object Pronoun

"Whom" is an object pronoun like "me," "you," and "us" in the object case. We use "Whom" to ask which person, place, or thing is the object of a sentence.

Examples:

- Whom are you going to visit?
- Whom did you see at the concert?
- Whom did you see at the concert?
