Visual-Spatial	Visual	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>prefers picture books, images,</li> <li>enjoys mapping things out,</li> <li>had good sense of direction,</li> <li>remembers faces,</li> <li>has a good sense of colors and color balance</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Picture books</li> <li>Have students create movies</li> <li>Allow projects that utilize photos albums/ scrapbooks</li> <li>Use of a white board with colored markers for various subjects</li> </ul>
Bodily-Kinesthetic	Physical	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>touches and manipulates new objects,</li> <li>likes to run, walk, jump,</li> <li>gym is a favorite class,</li> <li>uses body and hand gesturing when telling a story</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Incorporate simple yoga or movement (dance, Simon Says) into daily routine of class</li> <li>Pantomime words or ideas</li> <li>Include artifacts (shells, rocks, dried flowers, etc.) that students can touch</li> <li>Offer a variety of manipulatives for students to use</li> </ul>
Musical	Aural	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>hums and sings to self,</li> <li>loves to play instruments,</li> <li>often taps rhythms out when thinking</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Play classical music softly during class (Mozart or Chopin work well)</li> <li>Use chimes to call class to attention</li> <li>Sing brief instructions to the class ("Time to line up" or "Time for meeting in the circle")</li> </ul>
Interpersonal	Social	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>gets along with most everyone,</li> <li>often seen as the peacemaker or confident,</li> <li>enjoys group activities</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Provide opportunities for group work</li> <li>Give these learners opportunities to mentor</li> <li>Brainstorm with mind maps</li> <li>Role plays work well for these students</li> </ul>
Intrapersonal	Solitary	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>often seen as "shy,"</li> <li>doesn't often take risks,</li> <li>is the last person to enter a discussion,</li> <li>enjoys playing/reading/studying alone</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Include reflective journals in curriculum</li> <li>Have students tell about hobbies, interests</li> <li>Role play allows these students to express themselves by being someone else</li> <li>Encourage silent reading</li> </ul>
Linguistic	Verbal	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>the classroom "politician";</li> <li>enjoys sharing knowledge verbally and in writing,</li> <li>first one to try tongue twisters,</li> <li>wants to know where words come from,</li> <li>has no problem reading to others</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Role playing gives this student a venue for their need to talk</li> <li>Have student-lead classroom discussions and debates</li> <li>These students make great class recorders/ History keepers.</li> <li>Provide opportunities for reading aloud</li> </ul>
Logical-Mathematical	Logical	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>places items in order,</li> <li>enjoys creating patterns,</li> <li>makes lists,</li> <li>good at brainteasers or games that involve logic,</li> <li>mental math is not difficult</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Create a daily agenda for the class to follow</li> <li>Offer a variety of manipulatives for students to use</li> <li>Allow these students to create graphs to track time and weather for the class</li> <li>Keep puzzles, games, brainteasers for free learning</li> </ul>
